NOTES ON LESSONS FOR SUNDAY, JULY 16, 1967

(Lesson text: Joshua 3:5-17)

- 1. THE BOOK OF JOSHUA CONSISTS OF THREE SECTIONS. They are:
  - 1. THE STORY OF THE CONQUEST
    (1) This account is contained in the first twelve chapters.
  - 2. THE STORY OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE LAND
    (1) This account is contained in chapters 13 through 21.
  - 3. THE STORY OF JOSHUA'S FAREWELL TO THE NATION
    (1) Joshua's farewell address to Israel is contain in Chapters 22 through 24.
    - a. Chapter 22: the two and half tribes of Reuben, Gad, and the half tribe of Manasseh go back home and build an alter almost causing war between them and the Israelites on the other side of Jordan. (They said, "we did not build it to rebel against God, but that it might be a witness that we are still one and should always so be.") Joshua 22:25
    - b. Joahua's farewell address is contained in chapters 23 and 24.
      - 1. His first address was delivered especially to the heads of the people: leaders and judges.
      - His second address was delivered especially to the people.
- 2. THREE KEYNOTESWOSUMMEDM UP THEIR DUTY. These words are found in Joshua 1:11. These words summed up their duty; these three words sum up our duty. They are: (If these three words be omitted all will fail)
  - I. PREPARE

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- 1. The account of the preparation is given in the opening chapters of the book. Lessons we may learn:
  - (1) That preparation for any successful undertaking is vital and very necessary.
  - (2) That God's soldiers must be right with God before they can fight God's battles.
- 2. PASS OVER
  - 1. This is the note especially sounded at Jordan. The people drew their swords and flung away their scabbards, crossed the river and in face of great odds committed themselves to victory or death. This all teaches us:

(1) That ere God's soldiers are prepared to pass ever and possess there must be in their lives a definite, decisive consecration of themselves to the Lord.

- (2) It teaches us that with every step we take, something must go, something perhaps, which we counted precious yesterday. We must learn:
  - a. That to gain the promised land, we lose the manna. 5:12
  - b. We gain experience and lose the morning dew.
    c. We gain the strength and energy of manhood, and lose the freshness and wonder of the child.
  - d. We gain the peace and beauty of old age, and lose the strength and energy of manhood.
  - e. If we are to gain the peace and security of the promised land, heaven itself, we must leave behind the "old man" buried in the plains of Moab.
