In a general sense there is nothing new under the sun. temptation still comes in the same old ways: the Lust of the flesh, lust of the eyes, Pride of life.

But the specifics have changed with each passing generation, and they think up new ways, new customs, and different ways of committing the same old sins.

We are prone to say to ourselves

"The Bible doesn't say anything about this particular act, whether right or wrong, so it leaves me free to indulge or not as I see fit. "ISD must have secular knowledge fit But the Bible was not written for just the generation living at the time, it was written to be a guide and a light for all time to come.

Much as we might wish it set everything down in either black or white, do ord don't, God did not give it to us that way. Our voillow God dealt with the things that happened at the time the Bible was being written, but in such a

ay that the principles made known by the Holy Spirit then are applicable nader to any situation that may arise today, and these principles applied to today's course of action are just as valid a guide as if they had been set down in so many words, black or white, do or don't. God did not make us as animals, he gave us a spirit, a mind, reasoning power to understand His will, make known to us through these principles. + a heart to love Him Command-Ex-nec. inf. How grateful we should be that God deals with us in such great mercy in this Christian dispensation. Under the Mosaic Law, the laws were all spelled out specifically, black and white, do or don't. It may have made it easier to know at a glance just what God wanted done, right down to the minutest detail, and there were many of them. BUT it left no room for mercy if one of these laws were broken. They must all be kept right down to the smallest jot or tittle, for one to be justified in God's sight then. No one ever was able to do this, and that is why the Law of Moses was unable to effect man's salvation. A law of mercy and grace, had to be given, for under the law of Moses every trans-gression and disobedience received a JUST recompense of reward, and Hel 13:9

justice meant death. (Heb. 2:2)
Heb. 10:28 says "he died without
MERCY on the word of 2 or 3 witnesses."
Compare Heb 8:12

Under the law of Moses there was no allowance made for the differences between the BABE IN CHRIST and the MATURE CHRISTIAN, or between the WEAK CHRISTIAN and the STRONG. Read 1 Cor. 8.

There was no place for @ROWTH IN KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING, or for ADDING to our faith the seven Christian graces mentioned in 2 Peter 1:5-7, in ever INCREASING amounts.

There was no ifference under the law for fendering a willing service to God in a measure based on our love and gratitude for God Sulen obedience.

An example of what I mean by this may be cited in the law to the Jews concerning their giving: a tithe, specific amounts set down. Under the law of Christ, the N.T. no specific amount is given, no YES or NO amount, no BLACK or WHITE deal, but it is to be based on our ever-increasing love for God and His mercies. It donot mean to say that God has a different rule for each person, or that each person makes up his

own rules to live bybased on some

personal "interpretation" of the N.T., but I am saying that the Lord expects more of some than others, based on therefore their differing opportunities, the length of time they have been Christians, their knowledge, maturity as a Christian, etc.

Just as parents expect more of their older children than of their infant, so God is not satisfied

Just as parents expect more of their older children than of their infant, so God is not satisfied with the lives and growth in know-ledge and experience of one who has been a Christian for many years, when compared with a babe in Christ. "For when By REASON OF THE TIME YE OUGHT TO BE TEACHERS, ye have need again that some one teach you the rudiments of the first principles of the oracles of God; and are experienced to the mature Christian has grown in knowledge of God's word, and experienced.

The mature Christian has grown in knowledge of God's word, and experience in using it, that he is better able to distinguish between good and evil. (Heb. 5:14)

We should beware lest we become satisfied to stay in the class of "babes in Christ", and thus fail to add the Christian graces to our lives, continually growing in them. We will surely fall if we fail to add them, and will never be able to use the principles AKXRXARR given in the N.T. to help us "discern good arom evil".

Some of the guidelines which will help us make choices as to our course of action, whether acertain thing is right or wrong may be found in the following translation:

- 1. The test is not: "Everybody's doing it! It must be all right."
 Gen. 6:12; Rom. 12:1,2
 allflesh had corrupted his way.
- 2. Be thoroughly convinced in your own mind about the rightness of it, Remembering always that a clear conscience alone does not prove a thing right. Rom. 14:23; Jno. 16:2
 - 3. Is it something that will lead to intemperance? See Habakkuk
 2:5; 2 Pet. 1:6.
 - 4. Will it influence someone else to sin? The test of a Christian is whether one is willing to deny self for the sake of a weak bro=ther. Matt. 16:24; Rom. 14:15; 1 Cor. 10:31; Rom. 14:21; 1 Cor. 8:13.
 - 5. Will my light as a Christian shine if I follow this course of action? Or will the church suffer reproach because of my indulgence in it? Thess. 5:22
 - 6. Can I honestly ask God to be with me as I engage in it?

7. Will it encourage to live nearer to Christ? See the good of others, 1 Cor. 10:24; Rom. 15:2 8. Will this behavior be becoming to the gospel of Christ?
